New Archaeological Discovery In Israel Dubbed 'Greeting From Christian Pilgrims' 1,500 Years Ago

The discovery of a Byzantine-period church in the northern Negev, with wall art displaying ships, opens a window to the world of Christian pilgrims visiting the Holy Land 1,500 years ago, according to the Israel Antiquities Authority. "The drawings provide first-hand evidence about the ships they traveled in and the maritime world of that

time," said IAA Director Eli Escusido, describing the finds in southern Israel's large desert as "surprising and intriguing." The IAA has been carrying out a rescue excavation for several years at the archaeological site located in the Bedouin city of Rahat in preparation for a neighborhood expansion project. Excavation directors called the find "a greeting from Christian pilgrims" who arrived by ship to Gaza port, telling the story of settlement in the Northern Negev at the end of the Byzantine period (from approximately A.D. 395 — when the Roman Empire was split — to 1453) and in the beginning of the early Islamic period. The archaeologists suggest Christian pilgrims visited the church after landing in the port, leaving their personal mark in the form of ship drawings on its walls.

REFLECTING ON GOD'S WORD AND LIVING OUR FAITH EACH DAY

JUNE 23, 2024 12TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME: LIVING IN FAITH

By the time we get to this chapter 38 in the Book of Job, we've pretty much "walked with Job" through some difficult

personal losses and challenges to his life and faith in this folktale book of wisdom, revealing theological questions. Job's friends and neighbors have been speaking with him. They all are trying to deal with "why bad things happen to good people". As the story unfolds, we learn more about God's deep wisdom and love for his people in the midst of their storms. And our lives, too.

Whether it is God addressing Job amid the storms and difficulties in his life, or Jesus calming the storm that is overwhelming the boats of the disciples, there is a challenge to the faith of the listeners. They, and we, are assured that, indeed, God is in charge here. At the time this Gospel was written, the young Church led by the apostles was being persecuted. The powerful symbol of the storm being calmed by the word and power of Jesus would be a reminder to the fear -filled disciples that the Holy Spirit was given to them, that the Lord was still with them. They would remember that Jesus could both calm the seas and have power over evil just as he had healed many during his earthly ministry.

There are times and circumstances that may make it seem less easy to depend on God, but, as St. Paul tells us through his letter to the Corinthians, because Jesus has risen, we have hope. The love of Christ for all God's people gives us hope, and that same love impels us – urges us most strongly – to believe and to witness to the power of God in and through Jesus.

This is the same faith and power that we must nourish in our own lives, to face and grapple with our challenges. We do not confront these alone. Jesus assures us that He will always be with us, and that the Father has sent the Holy Spirit to be our guide and strength, our advocate in times of trouble, as well as in time of joy and peace. We are empowered by our faith and the grace of God to hope, to know that there is some good that needs to be drawn from each storm in our lives. That is God's promise. Our faith, family, and friends are companions in the day-to-day realities of life; they are our support and encouragement.

May you and each of us be strengthened by God's grace! May we always remember – and sometimes help one another remember – that our God of love, mercy and peace is always with us.


CATHOLIC SOCIAL TEACHING -3



There is something about the social teaching of the global Catholic Church that presents a challenge to us today. The Catholic Apostleship of Prayer offers monthly intentions chosen annually by the Holy Father. During June we are asked to especially pray for migrants and refugees fleeing from war and hunger, that they find welcome, safety, and new opportunities in the countries that receive them.

The fourth theme of Catholic Social Teaching focuses on our call to care for the poor and vulnerable. Called "option for the poor", it is not so much a choice, but a challenge to pay attention to the Scripture about the Last Judgment in Matthew 25: 31-46. This parable of the sheep and the goats expresses the corporal works of mercy we are to be judged on: how we gave food to the hungry and drink to the thirsty, how we gave shelter to the homeless and clothing to the naked, how we visited the sick and imprisoned, when we buried the dead. These, Jesus tells his disciples, are the criteria for entry into heaven, to inherit the kingdomprepared from all eternity.

These fellow human beings—the marginalized, the alone, and bereaved—are God's own children too. Sometimes we might need to be creative in finding ways to respond to the needs of others in fulfilling the works of mercy. At times, serving quietly behind the scenes works better; there are many ways of being present, supportive, and attentive to others, simple, quiet, prayerful, kind, thoughtful, generous. There will be times for us to step up and be the hands as well as the heart of Christ for those in need.

Está en silencio, como dormido, pero está atento a las grandes o pequeñas dificultades que nos agobian. Desde su silencio espera que lo invoquemos, y superemos nuestros angustiosos temores. Su intención es que depositemos nuestra confianza en Él, y no tengamos miedo a nada y a nadie. Él es nuestra seguridad y, sin eximirnos de los naturales temores, nos exhorta a obrar con el pensamiento puesto en Él. Así actúan los mártires y todos los santos. Producto de un aprendizaje difícil, que exige renuncia y confianza en el poder de la gracia. Los Apóstoles Pedro y Tomás transitaron un sendero escabroso, pasando, el primero, del miedo a la confianza y, el otro, de la incredulidad a la fe. Debieron aprender de su Maestro, dolorosa y humildemente, lo que debían transmitir al mundo. La humildad -o la pobreza de corazón- los predispuso a recomponer su capacidad de regresar arrepentidos a los brazos de su misericordioso Señor. No le ocurrió lo mismo al pobre Judas Iscariote. Volverse a Cristo, personalización del Padre, incluye dejarse abrazar por Él, sobre el camino del regreso a la Casa. Nada debe angustiar a quienes aman a Cristo.

El pensamiento de que Jesús -ahora resucitado- está presente en los acontecimientos de nuestra vida ordinaria, da sentido a todo, o nada tiene sentido.



Constituye nuestra seguridad y nuestra paz. Nada debe angustiarnos si amamos a Cristo. Quienes lo aman, como Juan y la Magdalena, se convierten en sus testigos y transparencia suya, como Él lo fue del Padre. El mundo necesita nuestra fraterna presencia, como expresión de la suya. Él es la salvación y don de Dios al mundo, inexplicablemente amado. La conciencia de ser amado invita - a quien es amado - a hacer de la vida una respuesta de amor. Es preciso alimentar esa conciencia, con los alimentos que le son propios: Palabra, sacramentos y oración. La Cruz padecida por Cristo es la manifestación extrema del amor de Dios a todos, y a cada uno de nosotros. Los santos se conmovían profundamente ante la Cruz. Es que allí comprobaban la magnitud del amor de Dios por los pecadores. San Pablo extraía de Cristo crucificado la verdad que debía transmitir, mediante sus admirables Cartas. Constituye un verdadero modelo de misionero. El mundo gentil necesitaba que el Apóstol lo condujera, con seguridad, a Cristo. Es allí donde el ministerio de Pablo encontraría un terreno virgen para la siembra de la palabra evangélica. No hallaría en él un cúmulo de preceptos y prácticas, impermeables a la Buena Nueva, como encontró en muchos de sus conciudadanos. La pobreza de corazón predispondrá a aquellos pueblos, de los que, la mayoría de los cristianos, provenimos. No obstante, como el mismo Pablo lo reconoce, nuestras raíces de fe están en el pueblo de Israel, del que Jesús, María y los Apóstoles, son miembros. El Antiguo Testamento, con sus admirables Patriarcas y Profetas, es el sendero que Dios ha elegido para que lleguemos a Cristo. No entendemos el Nuevo Testamento sin el Antiguo. El Dios mismo, que se revela por los Profetas y Patriarcas, lleva a su perfección la misma Revelación, en Jesucristo: la Palabra de Dios encarnada. Este mundo, abrumado por graves conflictos y contradicciones, reclama ser evangelizado por la Iglesia, fundada en los Apóstoles y Profetas. Es un reclamo "angustioso" exclama San Pablo VI, en su Exhortación apostólica sobre la evangelización (1975). Tendencias ideológicas contrarias a la Revelación están empeñadas en desacreditar a quienes se adhieren a ella; particularmente a los ministros responsables de su difusión.

If ever you feel scared, pray to Jesus right away. He can help to calm your fear, and He can help you to make good decisions. God is always


there for us, even when things seem hopeless!



June 24 falls on a Monday this year, and the Church celebrates the birth of John the Baptist, who is often described as the last of the Old Testament prophets and the bridge between Judaism and Christianity. More commonly, John is known as the "precursor" of our Lord Jesus Christ. All the Gospels report John's basic message: Repent, the kingdom is near at hand. One greater than I is coming. Though he was a wandering preacher who dressed in camel skins and ate grasshoppers, John's legacy is one of true royalty. His origins are similar to those foretold by God through the prophet Isaiah: "You are my servant, he said to me, Israel through whom I show my glory" (Isaiah 49:3). John's humility-"I am not he"-was surpassed only by that of his Lord Jesus, the humble servant who followed.



Raymond was born at Palma on the island of Mallorca in the Mediterranean Sea. He earned a position in the king's court there. One day a sermon inspired him to dedicate his life to working for the conversion of the Muslims in North Africa. He became a Secular Franciscan and founded a college where missionaries could learn the Arabic they would need in the missions. Retiring to solitude, he spent nine years as a hermit. During that time he wrote on all branches of knowledge, a work which earned him the title "Enlightened Doctor." Raymond then made many trips through Europe to interest popes, kings, and princes in establishing special colleges to prepare future missionaries. He achieved his goal in 1311, when the Council of Vienne ordered the creation of chairs of Hebrew, Arabic, and Chaldean at the universities of Bologna, Oxford, Paris, and Salamanca. At the age of 79, Raymond went to North Africa in 1314 to be a missionary himself. An angry crowd of Muslims stoned him in the city of Bougie. Genoese merchants took him back to Mallorca, where he died. Raymond was beatified in 1514 and his liturgical feast is celebrated on June 30.

Reflection

Raymond worked most of his life to help spread the gospel. Indifference on the part of some Christian leaders and opposition in North Africa did not turn him from his goal. Three hundred years later Raymond's work began to have an influence in the Americas. When the Spanish began to spread the gospel in the New World, they set up missionary colleges to aid the work. Saint Junípero Serra belonged to such a college.



It's midsummer! We have the advantage of celebrating one of the great hidden treasures of our liturgical calendar. There are only three "nativity" feasts on our calendar: for the Lord, the Blessed Mother (September 8), and tomorrow's birth of the Baptist, a date that is anchored by the Annunciation (March 25), when Mary learns not only of her own child's advent, but of Elizabeth's child. We are half a year away from Christmas Eve. There are strong traditions around this feast. Just as the winter solstice provides a rich vocabulary for Christmas, so does the abundance of light at midsummer inform this celebration.
