



REFLECTING ON GOD'S WORD AND LIVING OUR FAITH EACH DAY

20th SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME:
FULLY PRESENT

Today there are many aspects of the Mass and the Scriptures to meditate

on. The first reading speaks of Wisdom who, using images of food and drink, invites us to live in a way that honors our understanding of the way of goodness. Both the Responsorial Psalm and the second reading speak of gratitude to God for all our blessings. The Gospel of John, continuing the Bread of Life discourse, again emphasizes the importance of the Eucharist in gaining eternal life.

As important as food and drink are to our earthly life, all the more is the Eucharist – the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ—to our eternal life. Jesus tells his listeners that he is fully present to those who receive his Body and Blood, the Living Bread". He is fully present in the Eucharist, shared at the Last Supper and in each Mass.

As Jesus is fully present, "Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity" in the Eucharist, we are invited in return to be fully present in our participation in the liturgy, attentive in our reception of the Eucharist, and increasingly aware of the presence of God in all of creation. In the Responsorial Psalm, linking the readings, we pray that we will bless the Lord at all times. There is a theme of gratitude for all the graces and goodness of the Lord. This is the spirit of our Blessed Mother, whom we honored this past week on the feast of The Assumption. Mary was aware of God's great goodness, as her Magnificat expresses (Luke 1:46-55).

Living in the spirit of gratitude is joyful, balanced with a responsibility to live fully aware of God's presence in our lives, attentive to God's presence in the lives of those around us and across the world. We celebrate the mass and receive Eucharist not just for our own salvation but for the good of the world. Our small corner of the world is our arena, our mission field as Pope Francis calls it, where we are called to be missionary disciples, proclaiming by our actions, choices, words and prayer, the goodness of the Lord and the presence of Jesus Christ. Now we are called to be the "face of Christ in the world today as we journey to eternal life.

ADORATION





With thanks to Fr. Paul Turner for his insights, knowledge and writing, his blog and "Bulletin Inserts" and to Frederick Buechner for his "Alphabet of Grace", there is an incredible variety of material to share with one another. With a heart still well-nourished by the experience of participation in the National Eucharistic Congress in July (and all that has gone before in preparation and after in follow-up and mission), I offer a reflection based on a short piece from Fr. Paul.

Adoration before the Blessed Sacrament draws us into spiritual communion with Jesus. Whether done alone or through an Exposition and Benediction service, adoration of the Eucharistic presence of Christ fosters our devotion, love and participation in the Mass. Sharing communion at Mass brings us nourishment, healing and sustenance. The Eucharist is the source and summit of our Christian life.

Our belief in the Real Presence of Jesus in the Eucharist is central to our beliefs as Catholic Christians. Catholics reserve consecrated hosts remaining after Communion at Mass in the tabernacle. The primary reason for this custom is to have the Body of Christ available for the sick and dying at any time. Because it houses the sacramental Body of Christ, it serves as a place for adoration. We might forget that when we have received Communion at Mass we become "living tabernacles", not only nourished, but called to mission in service of our baptismal calling to be, as Pope Francis reminds us "missionary disciples". Our time of adoration and prayer is truly blessed, connecting with God who loves us immensely!

La familia nos enseña que somos hijos de Dios, hermanos y hermanas llamados a participar en la vida de Dios mismo, la Santísima Trinidad. Aquí es donde aprendemos a reconocer el carácter sagrado de toda vida humana y la belleza (y la necesidad) de vivir juntos en paz. Ahí es donde descubrimos el principio fundamental que fundamenta todos los derechos humanos y la dignidad: Toda persona, independientemente de su sexo, raza, religión, situación económica o social, merece nuestro respeto. Ahí es donde aprendemos que la familia es la única base sólida v duradera sobre la que pueden construirse sociedades sanas. - Cardenal Joseph W. Tobin, C.Ss.R.

It tells us that the Mass is the best way of giving thanks to God. It also reminds us that we should be very thankful to Jesus for coming to us and giving Himself to us.


We should thank Jesus as soon as we have received Holy Communion. But don't stop








THE NAME PIUS X

Pope Pius X is perhaps best remembered for his encouragement of the frequent reception of Holy Communion, especially by children. The second of 10 children in a poor Italian family, Joseph Sarto became Pius X at age 68. He was one of the 20th century's greatest popes. Ever mindful of his humble origin, Pope Pius stated, "I was born poor, I lived poor, I will die poor." He was embarrassed by some of the pomp of the papal court. "Look how they have dressed me up," he said in tears to an old friend. To another, "It is a penance to be forced to accept all these practices. They lead me around surrounded by soldiers like Jesus when

he was seized in Gethsemani." Interested in politics. Pope Pius encouraged Italian Catholics to become more politically involved. One of his first papal acts was to end the supposed right of governments to interfere by veto in papal elections-a practice that reduced the freedom of the 1903 conclave which had elected him. In 1905, when France renounced its agreement with the Holy See and threatened confiscation of Church property if governmental control of Church affairs were not granted, Pius X courageously rejected the demand. While he did not author a famous social encyclical as his predecessor had done, he denounced the ill treatment of indigenous peoples on the plantations of Peru, sent a relief commission to Messina after an earthquake, and sheltered refugees at his own expense. On the 11th anniversary of his election as pope, Europe was plunged into World War I. Pius had foreseen it, but it killed him. "This is the last affliction the Lord will visit on me. I would gladly give my life to save my poor children from this ghastly scourge." He died a few weeks after the war began, and was canonized in 1954.

Reflection

His humble background was no obstacle in relating to a personal God and to people whom he loved genuinely. Pius X gained his strength, his gentleness and warmth for people from the source of all gifts, the Spirit of Jesus. In contrast, we often feel embarrassed by our backgrounds. Shame makes us prefer to remain aloof from people whom we perceive as superior. If we are in a superior position, on the other hand, we often ignore simpler people. Yet we, too, have to help "restore all things in Christ," especially the wounded people of God. - franciscanmedia.org

The Ursuline Nuns

CERTIFICATES!

Sometimes the heat of summer translates into unrest in a city's streets. In the summer of 1834, popular sentiment against the presence of the Ursuline nuns near Boston reached a boiling point. An

influx of Irish laborers had an impact on the work force in the city, and a deep-seated resentment against Catholics fueled the fire. The nuns supported themselves with a school, and most of the young women students were drawn from patrician Protestant families. Nevertheless, rumors fed by the saga of an unhappy junior sister and a later episode of a senior sister fleeing the place increased tensions. The city's selectmen were given a tour by the disgruntled sister, who by then had returned, and found all things in good order. That didn't please the mob, and the mother superior didn't help matters when she said that the bishop had platoons of Irishmen at hand, twenty thousand strong, to do marauders harm. By August 11, the convent had been invaded, ransacked, and burned to the ground. The nuns fled to Maine and Canada. The diocese attempted to recover losses, but the commonwealth offered only ten thousand dollars, which was rejected. Years later, a legislative bill for the state to rebuild the convent and school was roundly defeated. Yet the enterprise of Catholic education had great resilience, and in 1946, more than a hundred years after the riots, the Ursulines returned to Boston to re-establish an academy that endures to the present day. -Rev. James Field
